Your gifts inspire our students to unlock their potential. Your generosity challenges our faculty to make new discoveries. Your investment creates a legacy of generosity. The impact of your giving this past year includes:

- The 800 students who will benefit over the next nine years from a new \$20 million scholarship program established by the Marion and Henry Bloch Family Foundation and the H&R Block Foundation. Through this new scholarship program, the two foundations will provide \$10 million to be matched by a combined \$10 million from UMKC and two UM System scholarship programs: the Promise and Opportunity Scholarships program and the Next Generation Merit program. This, along with a new \$10 million scholarship program created by the Ewing Marion Kauffman Foundation and KC Scholars, will create opportunities for students.
- The Board of the Friends of the Conservatory launched its 20/20
 Campaign, aimed toward creating 20 endowed scholarships by the end of 2020. So far, 13 new endowed scholarships have been established to benefit UMKC Conservatory students, including one who will become a prestigious Trustees Scholar.
- We broke ground and started construction on the School of Computing and Engineering's new 57,800-square-foot Robert W. Plaster Free Enterprise and Research Center. Despite this past winter's challenging weather, the facility is on schedule to open August 2020. Donors contributed \$32 million toward the project, which will house cuttingedge research and teaching labs, including a high bay structural laboratory, a nanotechnology "clean room" facility and a virtual reality/ augmented reality training and development center.

STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP SUPPORT




r. Larry Piebenga was a legendary ophthalmologist and UMKC instructor. In his memory, his family contributed to

The basic science study hopes to find ways to precisely assess corneal calcification and determine how changes that occur from the condition affect the ability to accurately diagnose eye diseases.


